- Help prepare intern for planning workforce


#### Two grants were awarded this year:


## FYE 2019 Budget



Revenue- 96% if accounting for Reserves



## **2019 Program Committee**

#### CCAPA Hosted Programs from 10/2018 thru 10/2019

90.5 Credits Offered

Does Not Factor In SNEAPA CM Credits From 2018 or 2019

- CM credits are measured in a quarter hour increment. One CM credit is granted for each contact hour of instruction, so: One contact hour of instructional time = 1.0 CM credit 30 minutes of instructional time = 0.5 CM credit. Minimum credit hour 15 minutes = .25 CM credit.
- Education sessions are led by one or more subject matter experts. An
  expert is defined by AICP as a professional who has contributed to the
  profession through practice, teaching, research, or publications or
  through completed works that proclaim individuality and mastery of the
  principles of planning and whose work demonstrates outstanding
  quality and professionalism.
- Education sessions use learning methodologies and formats that are appropriate to the event's educational purpose or objectives
- Education sessions are unbiased and nonpromotional. *Note: An organization's services or products may be discussed prior to or after the completion of the CM credit portion of the event.*

## Bills That Passed

HB <u>6939</u>- AN ACT CONCERNING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF MUNICIPAL CULTURAL DISTRICTS

HB <u>7152</u>- AN ACT ACCELERATING THE DEPLOYMENT OF 5G WIRELESS FACILITIES

HB <u>7192</u>- AN ACT CONCERNING MUNICIPAL AND REGIONAL OPPORTUNITIES AND EFFICIENCIES

HB 7209 - AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE CONNECTICUT MUNICIPAL REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (As part of budget)

HB <u>7277</u>- AN ACT CONCERNING THE CREATION OF LAND BANK AUTHORITIES

## Bills That Passed

HB <u>7361</u>- AN ACT CONCERNING THE ADOPTION OF MASTER PLANS BY TAX INCREMENT DISTRICTS

## Bills That Failed

# HB 6749-- AN ACT TO REORGANIZE THE ZONING ENABLING ACT AND PROMOTE MUNICIPAL COMPLIANCE

- Reorganization/Clarification of 8-2
- Increase Requirement About Zoning "Actively Promoting" Fair/Affordable Housing
- Requiring Commissioner of Housing to Provide Guidance on:
  - Zoning Regulations
  - Affordable Housing Plans (PA 17-170)
- No Financial Liability

# Bills That Failed

SB 1107-- AN ACT CONCERNING THE TERMS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CONNECTICUT TRUST FOR HISTORIC PRESERVATION AND CONSTRUCTION INVOLVING HISTORIC STRUCTURES

SB 522 – AN ACT CONCERNING ALTERNATE MEMBERS OF PLANNING COMMISSIONS

HB 5229 – AN ACT DEFINING ADVERTISING SIGN FOR THE PURPOSES OF MUNICIPAL ZONING REGULATIONS

HB 5123 - AN ACT PROHIBITING THE USE OF EMINENT DOMAIN FOR COMMERCIAL PURPOSES

550– AN ACT CONCERNING GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS

6756 – AN ACT CONCERNING OPEN SPACE PRESERVATION IN CLUSTER

5273 - AN ACT CONCERNING AS OF RIGHT MULTIFAMILY HOUSING ZONES

- Package of Minor Fixes
  - Reducing/Eliminating Newspaper Notification
  - Revise 8-25 Family-Transfer Subdivisions
  - Revise 14-54 to refer to Zoning/Staff vs. ZBA
- Time Limits on Special Permits, Non-Conformities
- Revisit SB 550 (Statewide GIS Standards/Clearinghouse)
- Clarify Coastal Area Management Statutes




